The recipe I am going to review for any prescriptive language is French Toast (link will be at the bottom of the paper). There are four steps in total so I will cover them each respectively. As this a straight up command it fits under prescriptive statements, for she is telling me to beat an egg along with the other ingredients in a specific manner. In the third step which is the final non-optional step is, "cook bread slices on lightly greased nonstick griddle or skillet on medium heat until browned on both sides, served with easy spice syrup(recipe follows), if desired." Once again it is a mix of commands and advice, so it prescriptive statements.
