Course Description

This course is an exploration of gender and sexual identity in U.S culture, and includes gender and sexual discrimination and harassment. The relationship between gender and sex and other aspects of our personal and social identities, such as race/ethnicity, age, physical disabilities will be examined. - 1. Describe and distinguish the concepts of gender, sexuality, and sexual orientation.
- 2. Differentiate between one's social and personal identities.
- 3. Describe identity development theories.
- 4. Recognize Non-Western views of sex and gender identity.
- 5. Identify and examine sex and gender stereotypes in society.
- 6. Define and describe systems of power and privilege in U.S. society.
- 7. Define sexual discrimination including sexual harassment and sexism.

Participation Assignments: In lieu of the participation activities such as group projects and journaling that we would do in a face-to-face classroom, I will ask you to do various assignments each week to demonstrate that you are engaging with the material. There will be the opportunity for one extra credit participation assignment.

Weekly Quizzes: You will have weekly quizzes on the material presented in the video lectures and readings from the textbook. There will be the opportunity for one extra credit quiz.

Reflections Papers: You will be asked to write 2-3-page reflection papers throughout the course on various topics from class. Detailed instructions will be provided.

Research Paper: You will be asked to write a 5-page research paper. Detailed instructions will be provided.

Research Presentation: For this assignment you will present the findings of your research paper to the class by writing a summary or recording a video of what you learned.
